# The Lifespan of Waste

The waste we throw into nature can persist for extremely long periods without decomposing:

· Tissue: 3 months

• Fruit peel: 3-6 months

• Newspaper: 6-12 months

• Cigarette butt: I-2 years (one butt can pollute up to 500 liters of water)

Candy wrapper: 5 years

· Chewing gum: 5 years

• Motor oil: 5-10 years

• Tin can: 10-100 years

• Aluminum can: 200-500 years

Plastic bag: 450 years

• Disposable diaper, sanitary pad, or tampon: 400-450 years

Plastic bottle: 100–1,000 years

• Glass bottle: 4,000 years

### What is the purpose of the waste collection regulation?

The regulation also serves to protect vulnerable people: the elderly, those with visual impairments, people with reduced mobility, and children:

- Using bins prevents waste from accumulating on public streets, which can create obstacles for people with reduced mobility,
- Placing bins out just before collection
  and removing them immediately afterward
  keeps public spaces clear outside of
  collection times for people with reduced
  mobility,
- Removing bins from the streets provides safe play areas for children. Additionally, when bins obstruct the streets, proper snow removal is hindered, creating hazardous conditions for pedestrians,
- Ensuring bins are properly closed prevents waste from spilling out. This creates a healthy environment for children and pets, while also avoiding visual pollution.



# The regulation also serves to protect properties against pests:

Using a compliant container, respecting the collection schedule, and not putting food waste in the garbage bin are all measures that help reduce the presence of pests (rats, skunks, raccoons, etc.) around your property.



- Keep waste in closed bins to prevent it from spreading and harming the environment.
- Limit yourself to one 360 L garbage bin per address to help reduce landfill waste.
- Reminder: At the current rate, Montreal's Lachenaie landfill will reach capacity by 2029.
